#### A word from Louise......



"What is this life if, full of care,

We have no time to stand and stare"

The opening lines of the poem Leisure by William Henry Davies. I am always reminded of this poem at this time of year. It was read at the cenotaph in Oakworth Park every Remembrance Day whilst I lost the circulation in my feet as we stood and froze in Scout uniform.

No sooner have the days started to draw in and Harvest Festivals and Remembrance Day services are past than it starts.....

What are you doing for Christmas? Have you started your Christmas shopping yet? Only 50 days to Christmas, are you ready?

In this build up, do we become so obsessed with getting everything done, making everything perfect, that we rush through, getting frequently agitated by small things, losing our patience, until the day arrives.... then we can relax, only to find that we are too tired to enjoy the moment.

This has extended into our everyday lives so that every large or even small event builds up more and more pressure that we end up stressed out before we start. Sometimes it feels like that in our churches, when no sooner are the poppies put away, than the preparations for the Christmas Fair are in full swing. This year when money is even more restricted, why don't we focus on the things that do not cost us financially?

Time to stop.

At the beginning of November we celebrated All Saints, remembering those people who spent their lives in faithful service, an example to us all. Many of our saints chose to step away from the everyday bustle of life in order to concentrate on what was important, focusing on God and living lives modelling Jesus' example, often giving up wealth, prestige and status in the process.

November is a month of remembrance, not just Armistice Day but a whole time to remember all those saints, the everyday people who have gone before. We held a Memorial Service at The Drive where we lit candles and remembered. If we are remembering them why have we not learned from them?

## Paws for thought 4

Isaiah 11 v 1-9

Advent is a time to pause and re-evaluate our expectations as we look towards Christmas. It seems many places and many people are in turmoil as we face a winter of uncertainties, but

we do have a long history of Christmases not living up to our expectations.

Like many, my favourite carol is 'Cradled in a manger meanly' but it is the last verse that is so full of meaning in the way it pulls us back to the reality of the world. Written somewhere between 1830 and 1913, by George Stringer Rowe, homelessness and poverty were as much part of everyday life as now, if not more so. The only difference today seems to be that those who have no religious belief in Christmas, dress it up to look like fairy land.

Don't get me wrong, trees and lights, presents and mince pies all have their place but without Christ being central to the story it does become more commercial rather than Christian with the celebration of Jesus' birth. So, as we sing the carol this Christmas let us take to heart and praise God, the Christ has come!

## The Sound of Silence......

The world is in a hurry, people to see, places to go, altogether far, far too busy. As Louise also mentioned in her letter, the poet W.H.Davies asked – "What is this life if, full of care, We have no time to stand and stare?"

One of my greatest joys is taking my dog for our very early morning walk around Fairhaven Lake and then to stand and stare at an armada of ducks slowly and elegantly floating across the water. My dog is also attracted to the sight, but for different reasons.

(I dreamt the other night that five minutes after I took my dog out for a walk it started pouring down. Then I woke up, started the day, took my dog out for a walk and after five minutes it starting pouring down. Isn't it wonderful that in these days of doom, gloom and uncertainty that dreams can actually come true!)

But I intend to take time this Christmas, longer than just thirty minutes, to block out the 'noise' of commercialisation, indulgence and tradition to reflect on the day that changed the world, the day my Saviour was born and the enormous debt I owe that He paid for with His life, a life that began quietly in a manger in Bethlehem.

#### INTERFAITH MEAL

## Dining with a difference

I recently received an unusual invitation – for dining out with a difference. Lesley Turner had been invited to an 'Interfaith Meal' to be held at the 'Pensioners' Hall' - probably because of her ongoing involvement with the English Lessons – and in turn invited me to go with her. Priya came too!

The hall was set for about 80 people, with a tempting buffet set out. But we had to contain our appetites for a while, during a video and some chats from a variety of notable guests.

Our host Mehmet told us that the event was sponsored by the Dialogue Society - a registered charity, which aims to 'advance social cohesion' by connecting communities through dialogue. It brings people together through discussion forums, courses, publications and outreach and operates nationwide with regional branches across the UK. People of all faiths, and none, and of all ethnic origins, are wuntilelcomed.

The first to speak in support of the event and its aims was Andrew Snowden, Police and Crime Commissioner for Lancashire, and a Christian. He was followed by Allan Oldfield, Fylde Borough Council Chief Executive. Norah – a representative of Amnesty International spoke about how this kind of dialogue was becoming more important in our troubled, and often divided, modern world. St Anne's Mayor, Karen Harrison also spoke.

Serena , a Sephardi Jew, spoke passionately about her own experience as a refugee. She was born in Cairo to a prominent family (who knew King Farouk) and lived happily amongst Muslims until 1956, when Jews were expelled from the country. Her first 'home' in UK, aged 22, was a former POW camp in Birmingham where the December snow created a very unpleasant contrast to her former life. Fortunately, her Turkish mother had ensured she was educated in English so language was not a problem. She still cooks Egyptian food! She has returned to Egypt since and the Muslim occupants invited her into her former home. Her family's carpets and furniture were still in use there. Although she still did not feel 'at home' anywhere, she assured us she had no hatred for Muslims or anyone.

Nasrin came here from Iran to study 45 years ago. She was unable to return to Iran due to the war. She stressed the need for us to appreciate each other's culture and religion.

A Turkish gentleman, who not only demonstrated his artistic talent with a traditional water marbling painting technique, then entertained us on the Turkish guitar, whilst Hanifi sang.

The meal cooked by local volunteers was, unsurprisingly, varied and delicious. We sampled stuffed peppers, stuffed vine leaves, pasta dishes, baklava, and Noah's Pudding, to name but a few (because I could only name a few!).





Noah's Pudding (a Turkish tradition) is so named as it represents what may have been left in Noah's stores at the end of the Ark's journey, and may contain dried fruit, nuts, grains and seeds, cooked in one pot with sugar and fruit juice, and possibly even beans or chickpeas. Very healthy (if you overlook the sugar!) and delicious.

We chatted to several people, at our table and elsewhere and an enjoyably friendly atmosphere persisted.

I wonder whether anything else like this will be

arranged later? This kind of get-together can only produce positive outcomes, I feel.

And in any case, I hope Lesley invites me again next year!



## **Oberammergau 2022**

and the mishaps and adventures of travel! by Judith Smith

On the 6<sup>th</sup> of September, my friend Pippa and I set off to visit the Oberammergau Passion Play, two years later than our original booking. The play is presented every ten years, but as a result of Covid, it had been put back two years.

Our journey was, to say the least, eventful! A storm around Heathrow resulted in our being shuttled around the airport runway until it was safe for us to take off. Eventually, three hours late we took off for Nuremberg and received a complimentary bottle of water and bag of crisps for our delay. (I'll not name the airline but it had a union flag on its tail!)

Arriving around 9 p.m. that evening we were asked to wait on the plane as my friend needed assistance to get through the airport. We waited and waited, with the crew becoming ever more anxious as they were due to leave at 10 p.m to return to Heathrow and we were still sat on the plane. Finally help arrived and we headed out towards the exit with a nice young man with very little English pushing the wheelchair, and me with passport in hand ready to go through passport control. As we reached the lift marked baggage reclaim he looked at my passport and realised that he had failed to take us through passport control! We turned around but not very far as he couldn't go back down the one-way corridor. "Just take us to baggage claim" we chorused aware that the other people on the coach would by this time be getting rather fractious as we still had a three hour journey to the hotel.

Baggage reclaimed, out we went through the exit doors with two police officers following to say we must be escorted back in. I dropped the baggage in front of our tour guide who remained quite calm as if it was an everyday occurrence. We were taken into a little room and questions began to be asked as to how we managed to get out of the airport without getting our passports stamped. At this point I had visions of being returned to the plane we had just come off and returning back home! However, a senior Customs officer arrived, and after more questioning stamped our passports. You can imagine the reception we received on the coach as we settled down ready for our journey to the hotel!

We finally arrived at an unpronounceable village in the Tyrol area of Austria, where the view next morning was a picture postcard, surrounded by

mountains, green pastures and a ski lift. The rest of the week we saw little of the mountain tops but the cloud had its own majestic appeal. We visited places throughout the week, Kitzbuhel was very pretty with its cobbled streets but the next



day the weather proved somewhat of a challenge. The Tratzberg 16<sup>th</sup> century castle followed by a quick lunch before boarding the ferry on the Achensee lake. Looking through the rain and mist coming down from the mountains was a challenge, as was taking the mountain railway down the mountain. Bearing in mind we were just coming out of our summer heatwave at home, I really hadn't much in suitable clothing with me. It was cold and wet and rather miserable.

The following day we were off to Salzburg, a beautiful city, I had visited once before. Chewing a humbug on the coach, what should happen but my crown dropped out. Needless to say, I haven't had a humbug near my mouth since! So, the first call in Salzburg was to find a pharmacist and some cement to stick it back in. I'd stuck it on so well the dentist had trouble getting it out when I arrived home and half a filling came off with the cement. So, beware all you fellow travellers. In Salzburg though, tooth at least temporarily fixed, we went to a wonderful Organ recital in the cathedral and explored the coffee shops to keep out of the rain!



The next day in Innsbruck showed a promise of some sunshine and it was a bit warmer and well worth the visit, though the cathedral was closed for repairs. It was a Saturday and quite busy and we must have seen half a dozen couples who had got or were getting married parading round the town. The strudels looked amazing,

like all the flavours and colours you would find in an ice-cream parlour but I can't say the same for the savoury ones. On the way home we called in at the small medieval town of Rattenberg by the River Inn. It was sunny and warm with the sort of gift shops that entice people like me in. it was our last afternoon before we left Austria to drive to Germany, on to the highlight of the tour and Oberammergau and the Passion Plays.


It was a very early start, up at 5 30am, breakfast and off. The weather didn't disappoint that day, damp and misty, rain at times. It was packed with people, all trying to squash into the shops and cafes until the gates opened just before 1pm. The hall is enclosed except for the back of the stage but they had to seat 4,500 people ready for a 1.30pm start and they did it. Very organised. It ran until 4 30pm when there was a break for a meal and then we returned for the second half, 7.30 to 9.30pm 'ish. By midnight we were checking into our hotel, wide awake by that time.

As you can image the concert hall was massive and I have never seen such a huge stage, holding nearly five hundred people with the choir and crowd scenes. I counted seventy-two in the choir and they were magnificent. There were numerous children, in the first half, camels, sheep, goats, horses, and

let's not forget the donkey, all appearing at the appropriate time.



The actors took us from the Creation to the Resurrection, all in German but I had my trusty handbook to translate it all, until it became too dark. What an experience. Something I had wanted to do since I was a teenager but in retrospect probably more appreciated as an adult.



The journey home wasn't quite so exciting as our outward one, at least not until I arrived at Euston to discover the 11 30 and 12 30pm trains had been cancelled!

## HANDEL's MESSIAH

## Stepping Out in Faith: Sharing the Good News.

However, it is the most recent of our regular meetings that we especially wanted to share with you in this edition. We were delighted that as part of our intergenerational work, five members of the congregation agreed to join us at Time Out to explore our theme Stepping Out in Faith: Sharing the Good News.

#### The Leaders perspective:

"We had planned the evening to explore Gods calling to share The Good News and how, when, where and why we do this – never knowing where we may help a life be transformed.

We wanted to focus on shared personal testimony as a key way to do this and felt strongly that the young people didn't need to hear about this from us (they hear too much of our voices as it is!) but from different members of their own church family. We emphasised that each testimony about coming to faith and faith journeys are personal: some dramatic, some less so, they happen at different ages, in different personal situations and different places. Just as each of us are unique so is our journey with God.

We were thrilled that the invitations we extended to members of the congregation were so willingly accepted, but then slightly apprehensive that they would arrive and the young people would freeze up and go mute!

We needn't have worried, room 4 (the old ladies parlour) was packed with the 12 young people, 8 adults and a shared sense of respect and enthusiasm! The prompt cards we had prepared for the "speed dating format" were needed at times, but as the young people grew more confident and less self -conscious the conversations flowed – the adults handling the teenage questioning like pros!

It was quite humbling and emotional at times to witness the exchanges, the openness and warmth in which the young people were able to listen as well as talk about their faith and then to share in their reflections as to what they had heard and learnt.

After a shared time of prayer, chaos eventually descended as we introduced our guests to the very noisy game of Matthew, Mark. Luke and John —we hope that hasn't put them off from joining us again!" **C** and **S**

"I thoroughly enjoyed speaking to the experienced members of our church family, it was so interesting to learn about the journeys that people go on and the way that each differs. It was comforting to hear that even though there were struggles, they have all found their faith through various different means and it is stronger than ever. It was great to share opinions on Bible versions, quotes and daily routines, as well as just general life advice. It was very impactful — I hope we can do something like this again" Zara

We now look forward to joining the JKids with readings at the annual nativity service, before we prepare the Christingles and enjoy a Christmas social! The New Year brings the prospect of a day's retreat to the Chapel in the Fields led by Rev Kevin Johnson, visitors to our meetings and more ......

Thank you to each of the congregation members who joined us at Time Out, but also to those who continually support us through prayer and practical blessings. What a joy to be part of the Church Road family.

#### FROM THE FEAST OF ST.FRIEND

A Christmas Book by Arnold Bennett

"If then, there is to be a festival, why should it not be the festival of Christmas? It can, indeed, be no other. Christmas is most plainly indicated. It is dignified and made precious by traditions which go back much further than the Christian era; and it has this



tremendous advantage-it exists? In spite of declining faith it has been preserved to us, and here it is, ready to hand. Not merely does it fall at the point which uncounted generations have agreed to consider as the turn of the solar year and as the rebirth of hope, it falls also immediately before the end of the calendar year and thus prepares us for a fresh beginning that shall put the old to shame. It could not be better timed. Further, its traditional spirit of peace and goodwill is the very spirit which we desire to foster. And finally its customs – or at any rate, it's main customs – are well designed to symbolize that spirit."

From the "Feast of St.Friend" by Arnold Bennett (1867 – 1931). Of staunch Wesleyan Methodist background from the Staffordshire Potteries, Arnold Bennett is best known for his novel Anna of the Five Towns published in 1902. In The Feast of St. Friend, Bennett shares his views on Christmas as the season of goodwill, which in his traditional writing style includes some thought-provoking ideas, liberally spiced with his wry sense of humour.
